Executive Summary

Toronto Humane Society recognizes the value of the human-animal-bond to both the guardian and the pet, and with this in mind, we operate a program that takes a multi-disciplinary approach to providing services, support, and shelter to those in need of assistance.

We acknowledge that the best place for every pet is in a loving home, and the first step in all surrender services is to encourage guardians to keep an animal in its home environment, where this approach is in the best interest of the animal.

The Pet Parent Support Network leverages the expertise and knowledge of our staff and supporters, including PhD's, Veterinarians, Masters in Veterinary Medicine, Certified Professional Dog Trainers, Registered Veterinary Technicians, Certified Animal Welfare Associates and Certified Animal Behavior Consultants. Many of these individuals are recognized as field leaders and have actively participated in numerous industry continuing education seminars, publications, journal articles and even a few textbook chapters. Through these individuals we have and will continue to build and develop resources to guide our staff and volunteers in their provision of guidance and support.

Services and support are offered through verbal, personal dialogue, and conversations with a dedicated and passionate team of volunteers. Toronto Humane Society works to ensure that no human-animal bond is broken or fractured un-necessarily and that all pet guardians can locate the services support and advice they need to have their best chance at keeping their families whole.

Program Objectives
