Our Trap Neuter Return (TNR) program, ensures that community cats are given support to improve their wellness so they can live whole and healthy lives. This service is provided free of charge to caretakers.

Michael could not afford the surgery and asked if he could purchase some antibiotics to buy him some time to save up the money- unfortunately, the surgery needed to happen as soon as possible. Beaches Animal Hospital reached out to us asking if we could perform surgery for Mari- we were able to accommodate them and the cost of this surgery was waived under our subsidy program. Now Mari is back at home and happy with Michael!
