## Helping a Dog Grow His Confidence While in a Foster Home

A dog entered the Urgent Care program after his pet parents suddenly lost their home. They were unable to continue to care for themselves, their family, or their dog.

When the dog arrived at their foster home, he was very nervous. His foster parents helped build his confidence while his family was able to focus on themselves.

After 5 weeks, his family secured pet-friendly housing close to their family so that they could care for themselves, their family, and their dog.

In April, a stray dog was brought to Toronto Humane Society with a note saying that his family lost their home and can no longer care for him. Our team posted a [notice on our blog](#) to help us find Max's pet parents so that we could offer them the chance to enroll into our Urgent Care program.

The media picked up on the story and Max's story went viral. It was able to shed a lot of light on the hardships of caring for a pet with the increased cost of living and the importance of the Urgent Care program.

As a result of the media attention, we received the most requests for Urgent Care so far in April. With support from our generous donors, we will continue to be there for families experiencing an acute crisis.

What happened to Max? We were able to connect with his pet parents who ultimately decided it was best for him to be re-homed. [Max was adopted shortly thereafter.](#)
